The genre is targeted for adolescents however, many YA readers are adults. The subject matter and genres of YA correlate with the age and experience of the main character. The Adult (AD) titles are adult directed because of possible language and content and have been added to the list as we are a college prep school.

You as a family know best as to what the right fit in terms of genre is, content, interests, maturity level and topic appropriateness for your child. **

Graphic Novels

Grolleau, Fabien. *Audubon: On the Wings of the World*. (YA) Nobrow, 2017. In the early 1800s, John James Audubon, an ornithologist, traversed America studying birds. Despite challenging weather and wildlife along the way, he persevered to create beautiful illustrations still admired today.

Lockhart, E. *Whistle: A New Gotham City Hero.* (YA) Sixteen-year-old Willow Zimmerman reconnects with estranged family friend and real estate tycoon E. Nigma, but after he helps her earn enough for medical treatments for her mom, she is attacked by the monstrous Killer Croc and upon waking after the fight she gains powers and insight she will need to make the right choices.

Moore, Alan. *Watchmen.* (AD) DC Comics, 2008. Two generations of superhero's, including Dr. Manhattan, who deals with the responsibility of his powers, and Nite Owl, who wrestles with letting go of the past, dissect their collective histories while trying to determine who is methodically killing them all off.

Neri, G. *Grand Theft Horse.* (YA) In graphic novel format looks at horse trainer Gail Ruffu and her decision to take a racehorse from the hands of a group of abusive coowners and the legal battles that followed.

Reynolds, Jason. *Long Way Down.* (YA) Atheneum, 2020. Adapted from the author's novel of the same title.; "A Caitlyn Dlouhy book." As Will, fifteen, sets out to avenge his brother Shawn's fatal shooting, seven ghosts who knew Shawn board the elevator and reveal truths Will needs to know.

Uehashi, Nahoko. *The Beast Player.* (YA) "Elin's family care for the fearsome serpents that form the core of their kingdom's army. When some of the beasts mysteriously die, Erin's mother is sentenced to death. Elin is sent to safety and soon discovers that she can talk to terrifying water serpents and the flying beasts that guard her queen. This skill gives her great powers but endanger her life. Can she save herself and prevent her beloved beasts from being used as tools of war?"—Jacket flap.

Yang, Gene Luen. *Dragon Hoops*. (YA) First Second, 2020. An introverted reader starts understanding local enthusiasm about sports in his school when he gets to know some of his talented athletic peers and discovers that their stories are just as thrilling as the comics he loves. By the award-winning author of American Born Chinese. Illustrations.

Narrative Nonfiction & Memoir

Doty, James R. *Into the Magic Shop: A Neurosurgeon's Quest to Discover the Mysteries of the Brain and the Secrets of the Heart.* (AD) Penguin, 2016. James Doty, a distinguished neurosurgeon, reflects on his impoverished childhood, his alcoholic father, and his career in medicine to show readers how it is fundamentally possible to change the thinking patterns in one's brain.

Finnegan, William. *Barbarian Days: A Surfing Life*. (AD) Penguin Press, 2015. Journalist William Finnegan shares stories about his life as a surfer, a sport which has been an obsession of his since childhood and has taken him around the world.

Goodavage, Maria. *Top Dog: The Story of Marine Hero Lucca.* (AD) New American Library, 2015. The story of K-9 Marine hero Lucca and the handlers who fought alongside her through wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, discussing her four hundred mission career and the bond she developed with her handlers.

Heller, Peter. *Kook: What Surfing Taught Me About Love, Life, and Catching the Perfect Wave.* (AD) *Free* Press, 2010. With grit, poetry, and humor, Peter Heller, acclaimed author of *The River* and *The Whale Warriors* recounts his remarkable journey of discovery--of surfing, an entirely new challenge; of the ocean's beauty and power; of the strange surf subculture; of love; and, most of all, of how to seek adventure while crafting a meaningful life.

Junger, Sebastian. *The Perfect Storm*. Boys Town Press, 2014. (AD) It was the storm of the century, boasting waves over one hundred feet high--a tempest created by so rare a combination of factors that meteorologists deemed it "the perfect storm." In a book that has become a classic, Sebastian Junger explores the history of the fishing industry, the science of storms, and the candid accounts of the people whose lives the storm touched. *The Perfect Storm* is a real-life thriller that makes us feel like we've been caught, helpless, in the grip of a force of nature beyond our understanding or control.

Lee, Stacey. *The Downstairs Girl.* (YA) G.P. Putnam's Sons, 2019 "1890, Atlanta. By day, seventeen-year-old Jo Kuan works as a lady's maid for the cruel Caroline Payne, the daughter of one of the wealthiest men in Atlanta. But by night, Jo moonlights as the pseudonymous author of a newspaper advice column for 'the genteel Southern lady'"--Provided by publisher.

Lomong, Lopez. *Running for My Life. One Lost Boy's Journey from the Killing Fields of Sudan to the Olympic Games.* (AD) **Nelson** Books, an imprint of Thomas Nelson. 2012

Sudanese-born American Olympian Lopez Lomong shares his experiences of being kidnapped as a young boy to become a child soldier, his escape to a refugee camp, and his emigration to the United States where he was able to train as a runner and compete in the Olympic Games.

Miodownik, Mark. *Stuff Matters: Exploring the Marvelous Materials that Shape Our Man-Made World.* (AD) *Mariner*, 2014. Explores objects as ordinary as an envelope and as unexpected as concrete cloth, uncovering the fascinating secrets that hold together our physical world.

Ptis, Cindy L. True or False: A CIA Analyst's Guide to Spotting Fake News. (YA) Feiwel and Friends, 2020. A former CIA analyst unveils the true history of fake news and gives readers tips on how to avoid falling victim to it in this highly designed informative YA nonfiction title. "Fake news" is a term you've probably heard a lot in the last few years, but it's not a new phenomenon. From the ancient Egyptians to the French Revolution to Jack the Ripper and the founding fathers, fake news has been around as long as human civilization. But that doesn't mean that we should just give up on the idea of finding the truth. In True or False, former CIA analyst Cindy Otis will take readers through the history and impact of misinformation over the centuries, sharing stories from the past and insights that readers today can gain from them. Then, she shares lessons learned in over a decade working for the CIA, including actionable tips on how to spot fake news, how to make sense of the information we receive each day, and, perhaps most importantly, how to understand and see past our own information biases, so that we can think critically about important issues and put events happening around us into context. True or False includes a wealth of photo illustrations, informative inserts, and sidebars containing interesting facts and trivia sure to engage readers in critical thinking and analysis.

Purnell, Sonia. *A Woman of No Importance: The Untold Story of the American Spy Who Helped Win WWII.* (AD) Viking, 2020. "The never-before-told story of one woman's heroism that changed the course of the Second World War In 1942, the Gestapo sent out an urgent transmission: "She is the most dangerous of all Allied spies. We must find and destroy her." This spy was Virginia Hall, a young American woman--rejected from the foreign service because of her gender and her prosthetic leg--who talked her way into the spy organization dubbed Churchill's "ministry of ungentlemanly warfare," and, before the United States had even entered the war, became the first woman to deploy to occupied France.

Ricca, Brad. *Mrs. Sherlock Holmes: the True Story of New York City's Greatest Female Detective and the 1917 Missing Girl Case That Captivated a Nation.* (AD) St. Martin's Griffin, 2018

"Mrs. Sherlock Holmes tells the true story of Mrs. Grace Humiston, the detective and lawyer who turned her back on New York society life to become one of the nation's

greatest crime fighters during an era when women weren't even allowed to vote. After graduating from N.Y.U. law school, Grace opened a legal clinic in the city for low-income immigrant clients, and quickly established a reputation as a fierce, but fair lawyer who was always on the side of the disenfranchised"--Amazon.com.

Stanton, Doug. **12 Strong: The Declassified True Story of the Horse Soldiers.** (AD) Scribner, 2017. Recounts events during which, immediately after the attacks of September 11, 2001, a small group of U.S. Special Forces soldiers entered Afghanistan on horseback to capture the city of Mazar-i-Sharif and were ambushed in a battle in which they were outnumbered forty to one.

Fiction

Adeyemi, Tomi. *Children of Blood and Bone.* (YA) Henry Holt and Company, 2018 Seventeen-year-old Zelie, her older brother Tzain, and rogue princess Amari fight to restore magic to the land and activate a new generation of magi, but they are ruthlessly pursued by the crown prince, who believes the return of magic will mean the end of the monarchy.

Aveyard, Victoria. *Red Queen*. (YA) HarperTeen, 2015. In a world divided by blood-Red blooded (more common) serve the Silver-blooded elite, who are gifted with superhuman abilities--seventeen-year-old Mare, a Red, discovers she has an ability of her own. To cover up this impossibility, the king forces her to play the role of a lost silver princess and betroths her to one of his own sons. But Mare risks everything and uses her new position to help the Scarlet Guard--a growing red rebellion--even as her heart tugs her in an impossible direction. *Series*

Barnes, Jennifer. *The Inheritance Game*. (YA) Little Brown and Company, 2020. When a Connecticut teenager inherits vast wealth and an eccentric estate from the richest man in Texas, she must also live with his surviving family and solve a series of puzzles to discover how she earned her inheritance. *Series*,

Benedict, Marie. *Carnegie's Maid*. (AD) Sourcebooks, 2018. In this Gilded Age era novel, Clara, an Irish immigrant, takes on a false identity to gain employment as a housekeeper in Andrew Carnegie's grand house. Her relationship with the steel tycoon transforms him into America's first philanthropist.

Blake, Kendare. *Three Dark Crowns.* (YA) HarperTeen, 2016. On the island of Fennbirn, a set of triplets born to the queen are separated at a young age and trained to use their individual special powers: a naturalist, an elemental, and a poisoner. As tradition dictates, on their sixteenth birthday, the sisters will engage in a battle to the death; the victor gains the right to be Queen. *Series.*

Boulley, Angeline. *Firekeeper's Daughter*. (YA) Holt 2021. "Daunis, who is part Ojibwe, defers attending the University of Michigan to care for her mother and

reluctantly becomes involved in the investigation of a series of drug-related deaths"--OCLC.

Bowman, Erin. *Vengeance Road*. (YA) Houghton Mifflin, 2015. "When her father is killed by the notorious Rose Riders for a mysterious journal that reveals the secret location of a gold mine, eighteen-year-old Kate Thompson disguises herself as a boy and takes to the gritty plains looking for answers--and justice"--Provided by publisher. *(Series)*

Buxbaum, Jule. *Hope and Other Punch Line's.* (YA) *Delacorte* Press, 2019 "The tragic 9/11 event in NYC that changed the world, altered the life of Abbi Hope Goldstein as well as that of Noah Stern. They did not know each other back then, but they know each other now, and while Abbi is trying to move forward with her life, Noah still has unanswered questions that he believes Abbi can help answer"---Provided by publisher.

Christie, Agatha. *And Then There Were None.* (AD) Harper, 2011. Originally published in 1939. Ten strangers--each with a sordid past--are summoned by an absent millionaire to a private island off the coast of Devon and begin to die one by one upon arrival.

De La Cruz, Melissa. *The Queens Assassin.* (YA) Penguin Books, 2020. "The Queen's Assassin is forced to take on a mysterious apprentice on his most dangerous mission yet, pulling them both into a vicious web of secrets and lies"--Provided by publisher.

Griffin, Paul. *Skyjacked.* (YA) Scholastic Books, *2019*. Five teenagers from the elite Hartwell Academy are on their way back to New York from an end-of-summer camping trip in Idaho when they realize that something has gone wrong; one of them has become violently ill, and their private plane has apparently been hijacked and is headed in the wrong direction--and even if they can somehow break into the cockpit and manage to overpower the hijacker, they have no idea how to fly the plane, much less land it.
